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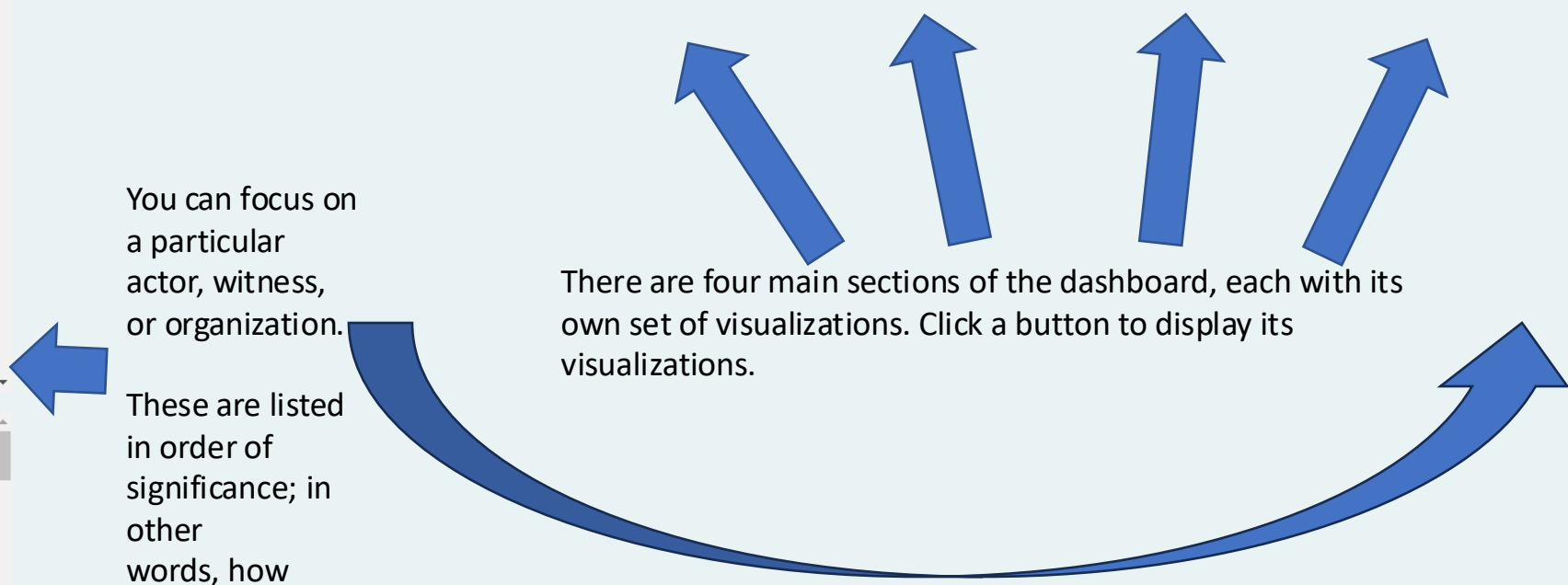

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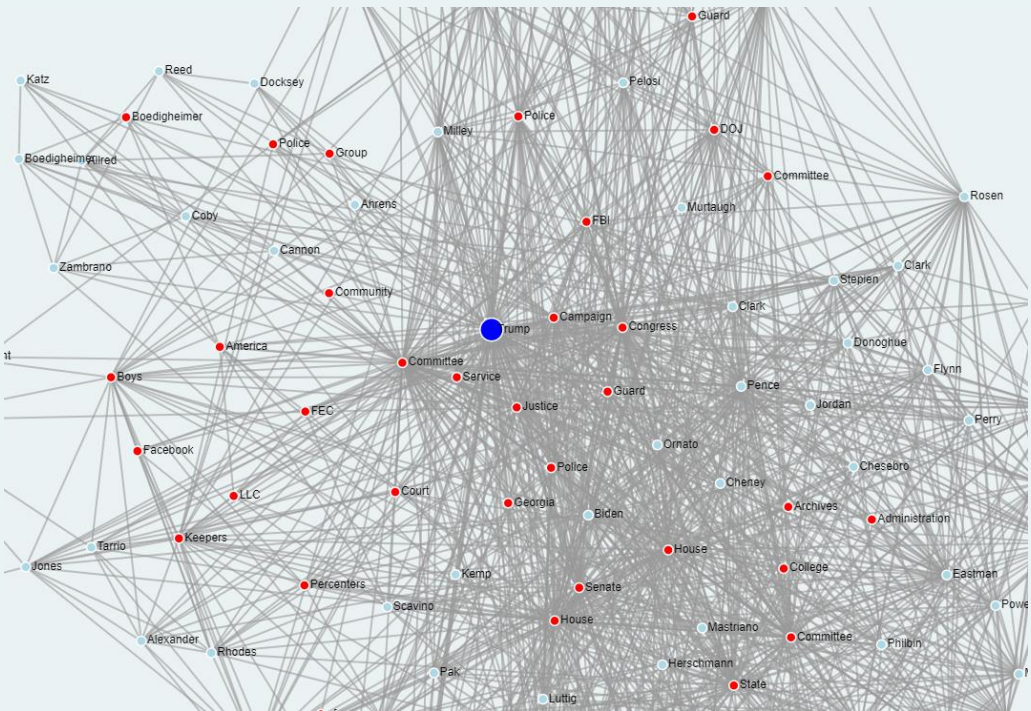

These are listed in order of significance; in other words, how often they are mentioned in the January 6 Report.

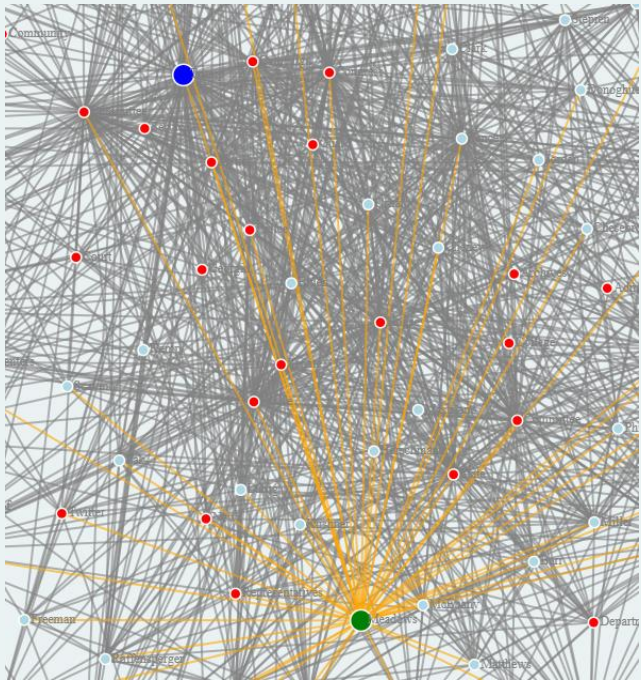
There are four main sections of the dashboard, each with its own set of visualizations. Click a button to display its visualizations.

It's as simple as point and click

This section shows a network of the people and organizations. Blue nodes represent people and red nodes represent organizations. Each link indicates interactions between two actors. Trump is shown in a larger circle with dark blue.



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When you click the name of a person or organization, the links connected to that entity are highlighted in yellow. Here we see Mark Meadows highlighted in green.

Hovering the mouse over a link shows the sentences depicting the interactions. Here we see connections between Trump and Meadows.

Clicking toggles between freeze and unfreeze mode.

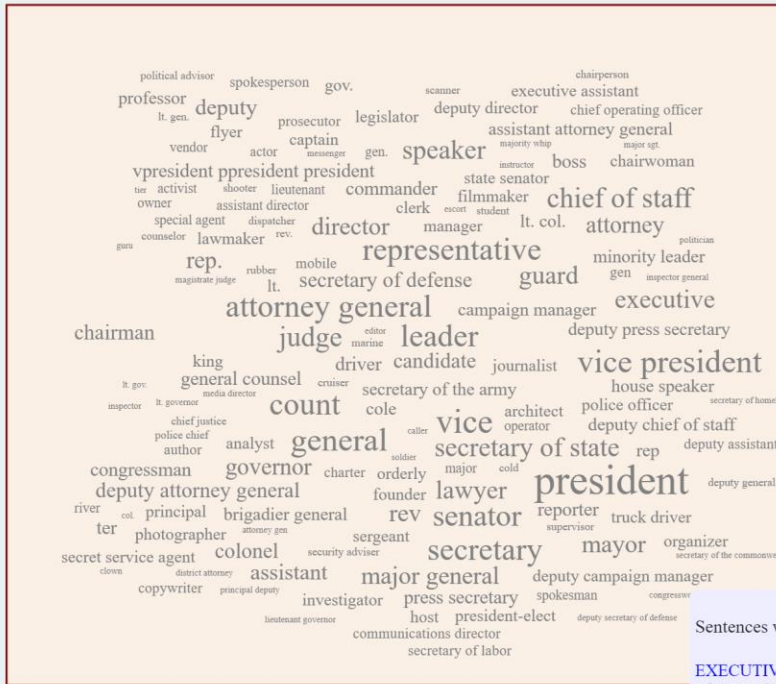
